Our quarter peals are Doubles, but we do try to do things differently usually by ringing multiple methods and variations. For example for a sixtieth birthday we would have six methods/variations with sixty calls. For other anniversaries we would also try to link the calls and methodology to the event.

Our most recent quarter peal was to celebrate Terry Clarke's eightieth birthday. Terry has been ringing in the tower for a number of years and is a very special member of our team. So the intention was to keep it simple to be confident of the quarter being achieved. Grandsire doubles with eighty calls. The first 60 lead ends were fine, then the conductor, who shall be nameless, miss called. A restart for a very successful quarter peal! The six ringers plus eight others assemble at the Lammastide Inn at Brookend for a very nice meal and a few drinks accompanied by Terry's tales of yor. A very pleasant evening.

But the most pleasurable ringing has to have been associated with celebrating the arrival of new family members into the village.

Sally Allen's grandson Arthur Fredrick Charles entered this world on the 21st September, but the celebratory quarter peal was delayed until November when the family moved into the village
accompanied by 1260 mixed doubles with Nanny ringing the treble.

And a month later came a quarter peal to welcome Lana Isobel Lorkin born into this world on the $11^{\text {th }}$ December 2019; the daughter of Sarah and Matt, both ringers in the tower, and granddaughter of Carole and Ian Bucknell, ringers at Bisley. ## DURSLEY

Frank Byrne

## Leslie Edward Martin

17 March 1952-2 December 2019.
Many of us in the Branch will remember Les. He was taught to ring at Dursley by his father, Norman, and is first recorded as being a member of the G\&B in 1967. He supported the ringing at Dursley very faithfully until he retired from ringing in about 2005. His last ringing was most probably for Norman's funeral in 2007. Our quarter peal records show that he rang 209 quarter peals at Dursley, conducting 3 which included the first for his daughter, Samantha. He and Norman rang 110 quarter peals together at Dursley and over, or around, 100 with 4 other members of the current band. In total he rang 39 peals, his first being at Stone, Glos. on 14 Nov. 1970 and his last at Dursley on 14 June 2003. Thirteen of his peals were rung at Dursley with his next highest 'pealed' tower being at Great Whitcombe (a tower seldom mentioned in the peals columns these days) where he rang 4. His later years were marred by ill health. His working life was spent at Listers in Dursley.


We had our tower AGM instead of our usual practice in January. This arrangement has been a regular fixture for many years. It's formal in that we have a chairman, usually the Rector, minutes are taken, tower officers elected. Officers for 2020:

We have re-installed our re-designed wooden shafted tenor clapper which was removed because of a split developing in the shaft and repeatedly breaking bolts. It was replaced with the previously Taylors supplied spheroidal graphite (SG) clapper. This was subsequently modified to improve its performance but it was still inferior to the WS clapper in sound quality. Fingers crossed that we will have no more problems.


## Hawkesbury

## Ian Unsworth

On 6 December 2019 Terry Chivers, Chris Cooper and I met with Colin Dixon and Ian Macfadyen at St Mary's church Hawkesbury. The main purpose of this meeting was to present a cheque for $£ 500$ from the Wotton Branch to the Friends of St Mary's for their appeal to install a ring of bells at Hawkesbury. This was the sum agreed at the Branch AGM in November 2019.


The details of the proposed work were explained to us before we climbed the tower. The two older members of the party waited in the first room while Colin took me on to the two floors above. On arriving at the next level one cannot but be impressed by the size of the bell frame above and the beams on which it sits. Massive is not an exaggeration! The frame is supported on beams running east/west while the bells would have all swung north/south.

On the floor in this space is an old elm headstock and a large bell wheel, presumably those replaced by Whitechapel when they rehung the one remaining bell for chiming in 1976. Whitechapel drilled out the cast-in crown staple, quarter turned the bell and renewed the fittings. The bell was hung on an iroko headstock and fitted with an iron chiming lever.


The frame, probably constructed in the $14^{\text {th }}$ century is considered to be the finest Medieval bell frame in the Gloucester Diocese. It is thought to have contained three bells. The bell weighs some 9 cwt , has a diameter of 36.75 inches and, was cast at the Bristol foundry in the $14^{\text {th }}$ century. Its fittings included a Medieval stirrup-topped clapper, an inverted pendulum slider and keyed ironwork to
attach its canons to the headstock. It has plain canons and was tuned by hand.
(details from: 'Church Bells of Gloucestershire’ Mary Bliss \& Frederick Sharpe, 1986).

The tower also dates from the $14^{\text {th }}$ century and is thought to have been built on the foundations of a previous, much older structure.


Following the visit I made contact with Chris Pickford, a knowledgeable bell historian. I sent him a couple of the photographs I had taken of the frame and asked if he could provide any comment on the installation. In return he sent copies of notes made by Christopher Dalton when he visited Hawkesbury in December 1989 with John Eisel and added a couple of comments.

Dalton's notes make very interesting reading as he and John are two ringers both regarded as authorities on old bell frames. When I visited I thought the frame looked as though it may have once held four bells not the three noted above in the Bliss/Sharpe book. Dalton's first note describes the frame as 'massive, tall and rugged' - I wouldn't disagree with that! His notes go on to say that he considers that it was once a ring of five bells. There were four bells swinging north/south, hung in a straight line with the fifth bell in a frame on the north side, the bell swinging east/west. This frame
has been removed at some time in the past. The treble would have been in the East pit of the straight line frame and the tenor in the separate pit on the north side. He also states that this would have meant that the ropes would have fallen so as to give an anti-clockwise ring. The notes go on to give the size of the bell hole under the frame: 53 inches x 48 inches. Chris Pickford suggests that this indicates a tenor of perhaps up to 15-17 cwt.

What happened to the four missing bells? When were they and the fifth pit removed? Now there's a project for someone! I look forward to reading the results of your research in a future issue.

## Wickwar

We currently have a good core of ringers who regularly turn up for Sunday morning services and Thursday evening practise. The local Wickwar ringers are reinforced by potential members of the band at St Mary's Hawkesbury, to be ready when their bells are installed later this year. It has been our pleasure to provide basic bell handling training for a couple of other starters from Hawkesbury, and there are more in the pipeline with some dedicated Beginners' evenings commencing in late January.

Meanwhile there are now sufficient numbers of Wickwar ringers to fairly competently ring Plain Hunt on 5 and we have even managed to get some of them to leave their favourite bells and successfully ring this, our first "method", on another bell. This complements the rather dodgy call changes which are usually our stock in trade, but which frequently fall into mayhem when the tower captain makes a wrong call..... Sadly, we have lost a couple of ringers recently as they have moved away from the area - Steve Amos had been ringing with us for about 20 years and Martin Summers, although a relatively new ringer, was making some good progress. We wish them well and hope that they will find new towers to ring at.

A second Tower Open Day in September 2019 appeared to have attracted some further interest from potential ringers but, sadly, none of them pursued that interest into actually coming along to have a go. Nonetheless we usually manage to fill at least 5 ropes on a Sunday morning and sometimes have more than the full compliment. When we altered our practice evening to Thursday, to accommodate new ringers while not inconveniencing the existing ringers, this now coincided with the Scouts who meet in the Churchroom, which is right at the bottom of the tower. Thus they get the full force of our ringing to accompany their activities. When their leader asked
if some of the scouts could come up to the tower one evening, we could hardly refuse and, of course, we had an entertaining time showing them the bells and getting them to do a few back strokes and hand strokes. There was definitely some potential shown but we are still waiting to see if any of them come up for another go, perhaps when the Scouts themselves are not meeting.

We continue to be grateful to John Cornock and Rex Isaac who attend the Thursday practice when they can and are very useful in improving our bell handling.

The Let's Ring group use Wickwar tower once a month (on the third Tuesday) and, of course, attempt all sorts of fancy methods that, with the best will in the world, our current local ringers will never achieve. We have also had a few visiting groups coming to the tower in 2019, including two lots on the same day! It is a privilege to have a decent ring of bells to be able to offer this facility.

The bells themselves are in good order, as was confirmed by a clean bill of health given by the engineer from Taylors of Loughborough who carried out the quinquennial review of the bells in December. After over 20 years' service, the tail ends of all six bell ropes were replaced last year by Avon Ropes and have now settled in nicely. They are much better to handle and look much tidier. Oh, and the exercise was considerably cheaper than replacing the entirety of the ropes, which had been the original idea.

In April 2019, the Wickwar ringers rang call changes in solidarity with the people of Paris and France following the fire at Notre Dame Cathedral on 15th of that month. We also rang for two weddings during the year, including that of the grand-daughter of our former Rector, David Small, who sadly died earlier in the year. The bells were
rung half-muffled for Remembrance Day as usual and we also rang out the old year and rang in the new at the turn of 2020 - which occasion is suitably illustrated.


During 2019, ten quarter peals and one peal were rung at the tower, including a quarter in July to celebrate the birth of the tower captain's first grandchild.

We received an interesting call from the Farnham and District Model Railway Society towards the end of 2018. They have constructed a model of Wickwar railway station and surrounds as it was in the 1950's and early 1960's prior to the station's closure post Beeching. The working model has been displayed at Wickwar Brewery in the past, and was a popular attraction. However, they now wished to add the dimension of sound to their model and, as the church appears in the scenery (perched above the NE tunnel entrance), they requested a recording of the bells. This took rather longer to achieve than it should have done, but they are now in possession of 5 minutes of the Let's Ringers at their best. This is good ringing and, with no offence to our current ringers, probably more like the sort of quality that the Wickwar ringers were achieving at the time. We now await the opportunity to view the model again once the sound has been added.

## Branch Archives

As you may recall Anita gave up the post of Branch Secretary at the AGM in November 2018 and we were unable to fill the position. Sometime later Anita contacted me to say that she would like to pass on the records
that she was holding as she felt that they should be with an active officer rather than left with her as her ringing future was still in some doubt. As a consequence, a few days later Anita and Ernest arrived at my house with three large plastic crates of Branch materials!

I gradually went through the crates and identified five main groups of material: minute books, G\&B Annual Reports, copies of Clangour (and its predecessors), remains of the Branch library and a collection of current folders containing a wide variety of items.

The minute books go back to the beginning of the Branch in 1910, with just one small gap. Jennifer Rogers went through these when 'Wotton Surprise' was being put together and produced a summary of each decade for the book. What to do with this valuable collection was discussed by the Branch Officers and it was agreed that they should be housed somewhere safe - somewhere dry and inaccessible to elements that might lead to deterioration, eg. insects, mice, damp. It was also considered that they ought to be accessible should someone wish to build on the research initiated by Jennifer Rogers. It was decided therefore to contact the Gloucestershire County Archives to see if they would be interested in the collection. The collections manager at what is now called the Gloucestershire History Hub was very positive about holding the collection at Gloucester and making it available for inspection etc.

The Officers subsequently approved the deposit of the minutes books which are now at Gloucester where they are on 'long-term loan'. The Branch continues to hold the copyright for all the enclosed material. The Archivist has been grated authority to allow researchers to quote from the records providing that the original source is properly acknowledged. We have a formal agreement with Gloucestershire County Council and a receipt for the books which will be held in the 'current' documents folder. We have been asked to deposit further minute books as they become full so that a continuous record of the Branch's activities is maintained.

The second large group of items was a collection of Association Annual reports, complete from 1962 to the present day. Again it was considered that these should have a safe home and be accessible. There are extensive sets of reports held in the ringing room at Wotton and Upper Cam. At Cam they are displayed in a cabinet with glass doors and have some dating back to the 1950s, left by Clive Legg. Alex Reeves and the Cam ringers have undertaken to house the Branch collection and replace poor quality copies if there are some in a better condition. This applies to a couple of years in the 1970s when a 'new' binding was used instead of stapling and proved to be very inferior.

The collection of Clangours is physically the largest set of memorabilia and goes back well into the last century.
The remains of the Branch Library contains around twenty books, mostly aimed at beginners/learners. Perhaps we might have these for inspection at practices and should you wish to purchase one, or more, I'm sure the Treasurer would be happy for them to go for a small donation to Branch funds. However, there appears to be some twenty books still 'on loan'. Thanks to Tim Soanes' meticulous record keeping I have the names of the people who have not returned their library books!!

With fines for late return standing at 10p per week the offenders may wish to negotiate an installment plan in order to clear their debts or perhaps discussing an out-of-court settlement with the Treasurer. At this stage I will not be naming-and-shaming these people all of whom have been members for over twenty years. If this stirs your conscience do ask me if you need to consider talking to your bank manager!

Finally, there is the box of current materials - minute books, attendance books, competition certificates and random pictures. I am hoping to pass on one box in the next few days and then the last one at the next Officers meeting.
